BOOK SALE 2021

DIARY BY RICHARD FRANCIS BURTON OF A WHALING VOYAGE 1832-1835

RF Burton (1809-1874) was the surgeon on the whaling ship *Reliance* and he kept a diary throughout the voyage from London to the Indian Ocean. The manuscript diary is illustrated and unique because of the notes on discoveries of shoals and reefs, as well as the charts and statistics he included.

Dale Chatwin, administrator of the British Southern Fishery website, writes about the Journal:

"...[I]t is the only known manuscript record of a British whaling voyage in the western Indian Ocean. There are only about 60 known logs/journals still in existence from over 2550 British Southern Whale Fishery voyages...[T]he narrative is so succinct and easy to read. [It is] well illustrated with whales, turtles, boats, lovely drawings of ships and flags and even a flag at half-mast when recording the death of a crewman...[The] real treasure is in the material at the rear of the logs. The charts and descriptions of the islands visited by the *Reliance* are absolutely first class....and Burton includes some statistical analysis of the voyage of a type I've never seen before...This is some 20 years before real statistical analysis/charting techniques were developed...[T]his voyage is contemporary to the voyage of the *Beagle* and visits islands and places rarely visited by the British."

Burton emigrated to South Australia with his family in 1852 and served as a medical officer in Adelaide 1861-1873.

A large amount of the total cost of the diary was donated by the Friends of the Library in 1997.

The diary has been digitised on the Library website and is one of the great Treasures of the State Library.

AUSTRALIANA PUBLICATIONS

Adelaide

We have some exciting publications on the drawing board.

Most of you will remember Alan Brissenden fondly. He was a stalwart of the Friends for as long as I can remember and, as well as being an eminent member of the English Department at the University of Adelaide, he was Australia's leading ballet critic. Bernard Whimpress, in discussions with Alan during last year, and with his family after his death, has compiled a collection of his reviews spanning more than 50 years. This will have broad appeal through the Arts community and we are confident that it will be well received. The book will be illustrated with contemporary photographs of the productions.

Meanwhile, in Sydney the eminent Paul Brunton, former Senior Curator at the Mitchell Library, is working on a book centred on paintings made by Phillip Parker King while circumnavigating Australia in the 1820s. The Mitchell Library holds most of these beautiful watercolours. Paul is being assisted in this task by recognised King authority Brian Abbott.

This book will be the centrepiece of bicentennial celebrations around the country when it is published later this year.

Trevor Grant and his team are editing and preparing our Henry Hammond Tilbrook book for press. Trevor found that the State Library holds his youthful diaries and that volunteers had already transcribed them. What he found was a fascinating record of social life in SA in the 1860s. Young Henry went north in SA in search of adventure, having been offered a job by Mr Elder (later Sir Thomas) if he could learn to ride and if he could get himself to Pandappa. This involved a coach trip to Burra and walking the rest of the way. There are fascinating insights into the lives of itinerant workers, land and water management, aboriginal relations and more. In later life, Tilbrook made a name for himself as a photographer and the book will be illustrated with many of his superb photographs of the areas he passed through. His descendant, Kym Tilbrook, who conducts tours through the same country, is writing the Introduction for us.

Others are working on a reprint of Sir Hubert Wilkins' *Under the North Pole*, the account of the aspirations, plans and dreams of an ambitious project to reach the North Pole by travelling under the ice cap in a submarine. Although the project was not successful, the book still gives important information about Wilkins' early life, growing up around Hallett SA, as well as insights into the psyche of this complex, extraordinary man.
